PROCLAMATION

“World AIDS Day”

December 1, 2010

WHEREAS, we close the first decade of the third millennium with both encouraging and disappointing news about the battle against AIDS. Recognizing that progress in this field is going to come in baby steps rather than giant leaps, we must also realize that no one hearing this proclamation will likely witness a “cure” for AIDS in their lifetime. We are experiencing progress in the development of a vaccine to prevent the transmission of HIV such as we experienced with the polio virus in the 20th century. That vaccine virtually eradicated polio nationally over a period of ten years. This last year, great strides were made in the development of antibodies, providing protection against 91% of the highly mutable HIV virus. One U.S. research group is hoping to have a variant of this vaccine in field testing in the near future. Other good news involves the continued research and development (R&D) of safer drugs with fewer patient side effects. New tests to determine which drugs are appropriate for a specific patient are in general use and as a crossover benefit have been modified for use in determining the best chemicals to treat breast cancer patients. As with the NASA space program, much of the AIDS R&D has been incorporated into other medical fields.

On the negative side we are fighting the same monetary problems that most of us have felt in our everyday lives. The global economic crisis and recession have cut many of the AIDS funding sources while we continue to test and gain new patients. Fighting for funds is a daily challenge for our medical providers. Funding cuts have been so drastic that some patients are not receiving their full complement of medications to treat the virus and its side effects. Fortunately we have not yet had to turn patients away. We also continue to fight the public stigma of this virus which has no socioeconomic bounds. It continues to be an “Equal Opportunity” virus.

The theme for World Aids Day continues this year to be providing for “*Universal Access and Human Rights*”. Twenty years ago a young man who had contracted AIDS as an infant due to neonatal hemophilia, died before current drug treatments were available. This nineteen year old spent his life changing the face of AIDS in America. He was the embodiment of Providing *Universal Access* to and engendering respect for the *Human Rights* of AIDS patients. His name was Ryan White.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Marlin D. Kuykendall, Mayor of the City of Prescott, do hereby proclaim December 1, 2010 as **World HIV/AIDS Awareness Day** in Prescott. I encourage the citizens of our community to fan the flame lit by Ryan White in his crusade of the 1980's. We must provide the most comprehensive education regarding HIV/AIDS, help detect those people who may be unknown carriers of the virus and most importantly support the treating agencies in our community such as Northland Cares Clinic with the resources they critically need. Education, detection and treatment are the keys to containing this enduring health emergency.
